

Highlights of the NAACP

The NAACP was created on the occasion of the centennial celebration of the birth of the "Great Emancipator," Abraham Lincoln on February 12, 1909. The atrocities committed against colored people in the Springfield, Illinois, riot during the summer of 1908 troubled the conscience of writer William English Walling of the Independent, a Springfield periodical. A wealthy Southerner and Socialist, Walling was moved to challenge freedom-loving Americans by invoking the spirit of the abolitionists who fought for social and political equality.

The local Drew County Branch of the NAACP #6042 was established to extend the furtherance of the National objective. At the local branch, members endeavor to carry out the mission, vision and objectives of the national organization.

WHAT IS THE MISSION OF THE NAACP?1

The mission of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) is to secure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of rights in order to eliminate race-based discrimination and ensure the health and well-being of all persons.

Vision Statement

The vision of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People is to ensure a society in which all individuals have equal rights without discrimination based on race.

Objectives

The following statement of objectives is found on the first page of the NAACP Constitution – the principal objectives of the Association shall be:

- •To ensure the political, educational, social, and economic equality of all citizens
- •To achieve equality of rights and eliminate race prejudice among the citizens of the United States
- •To remove all barriers of racial discrimination through democratic processes
- •To seek enactment and enforcement of federal, state, and local laws securing civil rights
- •To inform the public of the adverse effects of racial discrimination and to seek its elimination
- •To educate persons as to their constitutional rights and to take all lawful action to secure the exercise thereof, and to take any other lawful action in furtherance of these objectives, consistent with the NAACP's Articles of Incorporation and this Constitution.

Keila Foster

Dr. Keila Foster, Ed.D. was born in Baton Rouge, LA, and raised in Maryland. She is the daughter of Sam T. Foster, III, from Natchez, MS, and Annie Phillips Foster from Longview, AR. After receiving a full tuition scholarship to Howard University, she graduated with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in Journalism. After college, she followed her passion for education by joining the Mississippi Teacher Corps where she taught math in Sardis, Mississippi, all the while furthering her education by earning a Master of Arts Degree in Curriculum and Instruction from the University of Mississippi. She followed this achievement with a teaching position in Memphis where she served as a math and special education teacher.

On May 15, 2020, she received her Doctorate in Educational Leadership from the University of Maryland Eastern Shore. Her dissertation was the "Creation of a New School Culture: Administrator Perceptions of Their Role in the Implementation of Restorative Justice Practices." Dr. Foster plans to further her research through writing educational books with a focus on black and brown girls, continuing with advancing restorative justice practices in the public school education system, and advocating for period equality for incarcerated women to have access to menstrual materials through her newly founded non-profit Project Flow, LLC.

While in Memphis, she was Co-Chair of Women In NAACP (WIN) for the Memphis NAACP Chapter, charter member of the Shelby County (TN) Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., and contributing writer for the Tri-State Defender Newspaper. She is a subscribing Life Member of the NAACP, past Co-chair of the Howard County Maryland Afro-Academic, Cultural, Technological and Scientific Olympics (ACT-SO) program, and currently serves on the Maryland State WIN Committee.

Dr. Foster has also appeared on the Dr. Phil Show and CSPAN speaking on educational discipline equity. Dr. Foster considers herself East Coast based with Southern roots and branches. Currently she serves as a Work-Based Learning Coordinator for the Prince George's County (MD) School District. Her passions are writing, reading, yoga, cycling, and advocating for HBCUs. She lives by Jeremiah 29:11 "For I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

At Breaker, they give back to the community in many ways: they run specials; they support the local schools—Monticello, Drew Central and the University of Arkansas at Monticello— by feeding their athletic teams; they support the Drew County Little League, and the list goes on.
